

Raiders place 14th at state track meet

Anamosa wrapped up the varsity boys track season this past weekend with a 14th place finish in the state meet in Des Moines.

The Raiders did well the first day of the meet, earning eight of its 11 total points on a fourth place finish by the 4 x 800-meter relay team and a third place finish by Joe Beadle in the discus.

Beadle won third place with a toss of 164'8" in very close competition. He was

just 1 1/2 feet out of first place. Jim Holmes, Glenwood, won the event with a toss of 165'10" and Matt Haven, Independence, was second with a throw of 165'3".

"Because he has thrown further this season, I'm sure Joe is a little bit disappointed, however, this was his first competition at the pressure packed state meet and third place is a good finish," Raider Coach Ken

Fearing said.

The 4 x 800-meter relay team turned in a time of 8:01.5.

"They ran their season's best in placing fourth at the meet," Fearing said of the relay team. "Tom Redmond lead off with a personal best 1:59.6, Jack Simmons pulled us up one notch with a 2:02.7, and Dan Rushford and Tom Burke contributed personal bests with 1:59.7 and 1:59.5, respectively."

Iowa Falls, which won the class 1-A title, won the 4 x 800-meter relay with a record time of 7:55.7. Centerville was second with a time of 7:59.37 and Davis County, Bloomfield, was third at 8:00.67.

On Saturday, Beadle gave the Raiders their final three points of the meet with a fourth place finish in the shot put with a toss of 54'13/4".

Paul Hufford, of Mt. Vernon, won the shot put with a toss of 57'1/4". Ned Tucker, Winterset, was second and Keith Grave, Osage, was third.

Rushford qualified for the long jump and went on to place seventh with a leap of 20'8 1/4".

The 1600-meter medley team of Brad Bungum, Arnie Rushford, Dan Rushford and Tom Burke ran a time of 3:42.5 but was disqualified when a member of the team cut off an opposing runner.

Tom Secrist, who qualified for the state meet in the pole vault, was not able to make the qualifying height during the state meet competition

and did not place.

"Once again the medley was a disappointment in that we were disqualified for the second year in a row," Coach Fearing said.

"This meet put the cap on the 1979 season. All in all I'd say it has been a good year and the kids and coaches are making plans for an even better season next year."

Junior high track teams end season on good note

The Anamosa seventh and eighth grade boys track teams finished the season on a promising note at the Little Tiger relays at Tipton May 17.

The eighth grade team finished first out of five teams while the seventh grade finished third.

The Anamosa eighth graders placed in every event as they racked up 27 points in the field events and 106 in the running events.

The boys placed first in 10 of the 12 running events and second and third in the remaining two.

Coaches Paul Pinney and Ray Boehmke said one of the highlights of the year was the mile relay team's performance. With several different boys running on this team the last two years it managed to stay undefeated through seventh and eighth grade.

The team also set meet records and new school records in seventh and eighth grade.

There were 23 eighth grade boys out for track this year. The coaches said the team possessed good sprinters and good distance runners.

"This squad should be a fine asset to the track team in future years," Coach Boehmke said.

Pinney and Boehmke feel the seventh grade team made a very respectable

showing at the Tiger relays after doing very poorly in the WaMaC two days earlier.

The coaches felt that the boys learned a serious attitude is instrumental in achieving a high level of success.

Many of the boys who failed to place in the WaMaC came back to finish second and third in the Little Tiger relays.

The seventh grade boys were only shut out in two events and made fine efforts there before losing out.

There were 45 boys out for seventh grade track this season. The coaches feel they all show promise of improving in the future and should help maintain the fine track tradition at Anamosa.

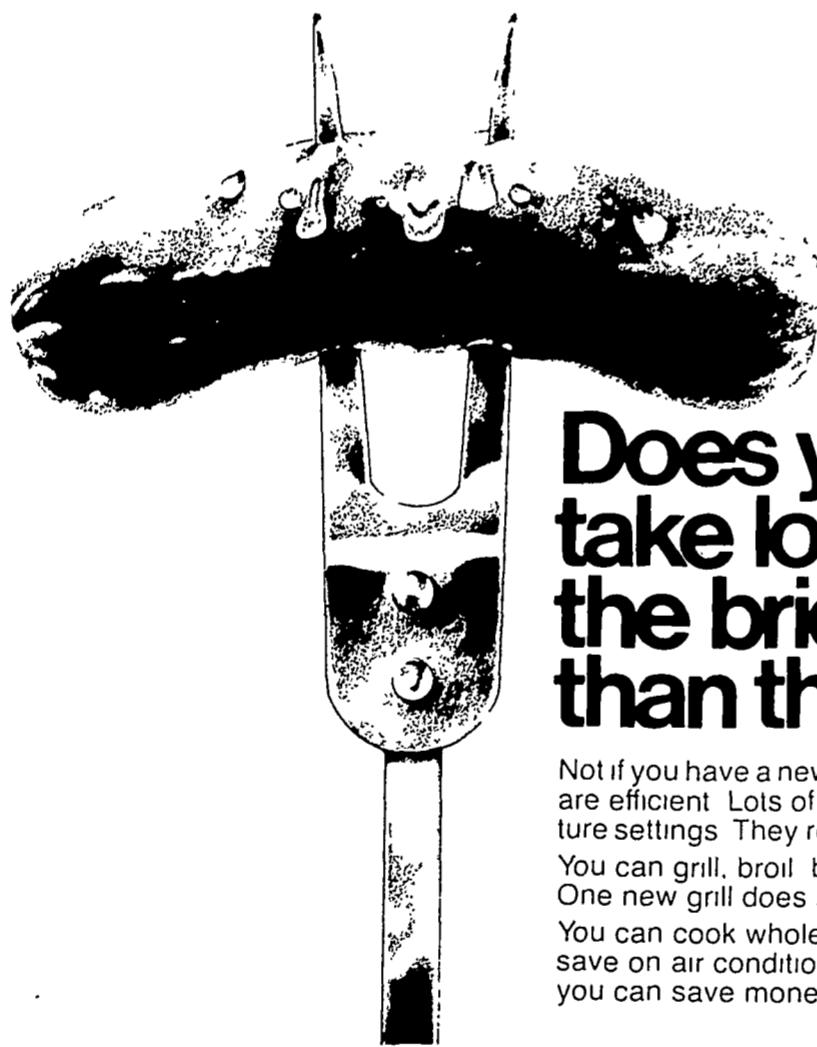

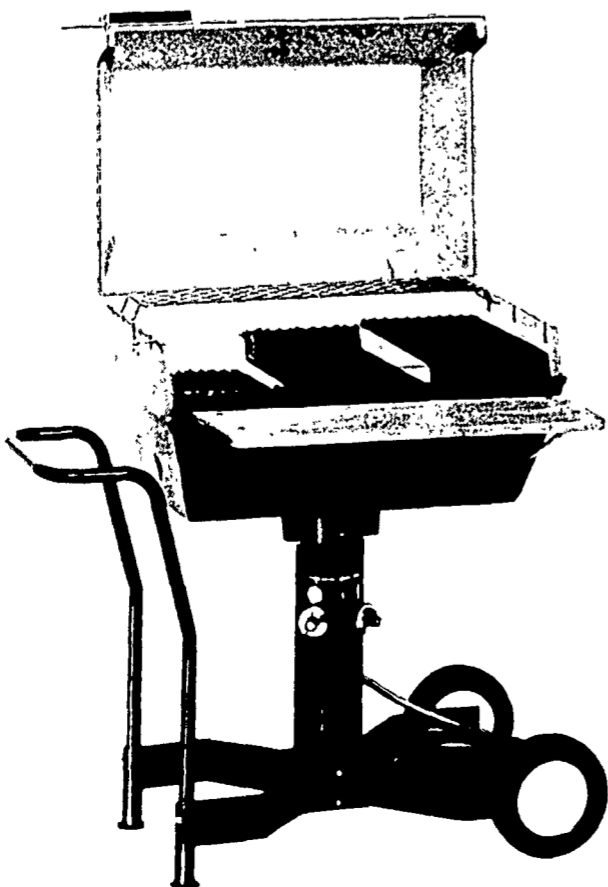
